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INDEPENDENT AUDITOR'S REPORT

To the Board of Directors of
School-Based Health Alliance:

Report on the Audit of the Financial Statements

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of School-Based Health Alliance (a nonprofit organization), which comprise the statement of financial position as of September 30, 2025, and the related statements of activities, functional expenses and cash flows for the year then ended, and the related notes to the financial statements.

In our opinion, the accompanying financial statements present fairly, in all material respects, the financial position of School-Based Health Alliance, as of September 30, 2025, and the change in its net assets and its cash flows for the year then ended in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America.

Basis for Opinion

We conducted our audit in accordance with auditing standards generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAS") and the standards applicable to financial audits contained in *Government Auditing Standards*, issued by the Comptroller General of the United States ("*Government Auditing Standards*"). Our responsibilities under those standards are further described in the Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements section of our report. We are required to be independent of School-Based Health Alliance and to meet our other ethical responsibilities, in accordance with the relevant ethical requirements relating to our audit. We believe that the audit evidence we have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for our audit opinion.

Responsibilities of Management for the Financial Statements

Management is responsible for the preparation and fair presentation of the financial statements in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America, and for the design, implementation and maintenance of internal control relevant to the preparation and fair presentation of financial statements that are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error.

In preparing the financial statements, management is required to evaluate whether there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about School-Based Health Alliance's ability to continue as a going concern within one year after the date that the financial statements are available to be issued.

Auditor's Responsibilities for the Audit of the Financial Statements

Our objectives are to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement, whether due to fraud or error, and to issue an auditor's report that includes our opinion. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance but is not absolute assurance and therefore is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with GAAS and *Government Auditing Standards* will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. The risk of not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions, misrepresentations or the override of internal control. Misstatements are considered material if there is a substantial likelihood that, individually or in the aggregate, they would influence the judgment made by a reasonable user based on the financial statements.

In performing an audit in accordance with GAAS and Government Auditing Standards, we:

- Exercise professional judgment and maintain professional skepticism throughout the audit.
- Identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of the financial statements, whether due to fraud or error, and design and perform audit procedures responsive to those risks. Such procedures include examining, on a test basis, evidence regarding the amounts and disclosures in the financial statements.
- Obtain an understanding of internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of School Based Health Alliance's internal control. Accordingly, no such opinion is expressed.
- Evaluate the appropriateness of accounting policies used and the reasonableness of significant accounting estimates made by management, as well as evaluate the overall presentation of the financial statements.
- Conclude whether, in our judgment, there are conditions or events, considered in the aggregate, that raise substantial doubt about School-Based Health Alliance's ability to continue as a going concern for a reasonable period of time.

We are required to communicate with those charged with governance regarding, among other matters, the planned scope and timing of the audit, significant audit findings and certain internal control-related matters that we identified during the audit.

Report on Summarized Comparative Information

We have previously audited School-Based Health Alliance's 2024 financial statements, and we expressed an unmodified audit opinion on those statements in their report dated June 26, 2025. In our opinion, the summarized comparative information presented herein as of and for the year ended September 30, 2024, is consistent, in all material respects, with the audited financial statements from which it has been derived.

Supplementary Information

Our audit was conducted for the purpose of forming an opinion on the financial statements as a whole. The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards, as required by Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations ("CFR") Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* (the "Uniform Guidance"), is presented for purposes of additional analysis and is not a required part of the financial statements. Such information is the responsibility of management and was derived from and relates directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements. The information has been subjected to the auditing procedures applied in the audit of the financial statements and certain additional procedures, including comparing and reconciling such information directly to the underlying accounting and other records used to prepare the financial statements or to the financial statements themselves, and other additional procedures in accordance with GAAS. In our opinion, the schedule of expenditures of federal awards is fairly stated, in all material respects, in relation to the financial statements as a whole.

Other Reporting Required by *Government Auditing Standards*

In accordance with *Government Auditing Standards*, we have also issued our report dated June 29, 2026, on our consideration of School-Based Health Alliance's internal control over financial reporting and on our tests of its compliance with certain provisions of laws, regulations, contracts and grant agreements and other matters. The purpose of that report is solely to describe the scope of our testing of internal control over financial reporting and compliance and the results of that testing, and not to provide an opinion on the effectiveness of School-Based Health Alliance's internal control over financial reporting or on compliance. That report is an integral part of an audit performed in accordance with *Government Auditing Standards* in considering School-Based Health Alliance's internal control over financial reporting and compliance.

1. NATURE OF OPERATIONS

The School-Based Health Alliance (the "Alliance") was incorporated in 1995 in Virginia to promote and assure quality primary health care for America's children and youth through interdisciplinary and collaborative efforts. The Alliance supports institutionalization of school-based health care nationwide to improve children's lives and opportunities for success in school and society. The Alliance supports its individual and organizational members by providing community, state and national advocacy, information and knowledge exchange, networking opportunities and technical assistance.

2. SIGNIFICANT ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared on the accrual basis of accounting in accordance with accounting principles generally accepted in the United States of America ("GAAP"). As a result, revenues are recognized when earned and expenses are recognized when incurred.

Financial Statement Presentation

The Alliance reports information regarding its financial position and activities according to the following classes of net assets:

Net Assets Without Donor Restrictions: Net assets that are not subject to donor-imposed restrictions. These net assets may be used at the discretion of the Alliance's management and Board. Board designated net assets are included as net assets without donor restrictions.

Board designated net assets consist of amounts designated by the Board of Directors for operating reserves.

Net Assets With Donor Restrictions: Net assets that are subject to donor-imposed restrictions that will be satisfied by actions of the Alliance and/or the passage of time. When a restriction is satisfied, net assets with donor restrictions are reclassified to net assets without donor restrictions and reported in the statement of activities as net assets released from restrictions.

Also included in this category are net assets subject to donor-imposed restrictions that require the net assets to be maintained indefinitely while permitting the Alliance to expend the income generated in accordance with the provisions of the contribution. The Alliance did not have any net assets with donor restrictions to be maintained indefinitely at September 30, 2025 and 2024.

Estimates

Management uses estimates and assumptions in preparing financial statements. Those estimates and assumptions affect the reported amounts of assets, liabilities, the disclosure of contingent assets and liabilities, and the reported revenues and expenses. Actual results could differ from those estimates. Significant estimates include net realizable value of receivables, the fair value of investments and allocation of functional expenses.

Fair Value Measurements of Assets and Liabilities

GAAP defines fair value as the price that would be received to sell an asset or paid to transfer a liability (i.e., the "exit price") in an orderly transaction between market participants at the measurement date. GAAP establishes a fair value hierarchy for inputs used in measuring fair value that maximizes the use of observable inputs and minimizes the use of unobservable inputs by requiring that the most observable inputs be used when available. Observable inputs are those that market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability based on market data obtained from sources independent of the Alliance. Unobservable inputs reflect the Alliance's assumptions about the inputs market participants would use in pricing the asset or liability developed based on the best information available in the circumstances. The fair value hierarchy is categorized into three levels based on the inputs as follows:

Level 1 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unadjusted quoted prices for identical assets or liabilities in active markets that the Alliance has the ability to access.

Level 2 - Inputs to the valuation methodology include quoted prices for similar assets or liabilities in active markets, quoted prices for identical or similar assets or liabilities in inactive markets, Inputs other than quoted prices that are observable for the asset or liability and Inputs that are derived principally from observable market data by correlation or other means. If the asset or liability has a specified (contractual) term, the Level 2 input must be observable for substantially the full term of the asset or liability.

Level 3 - Inputs to the valuation methodology are unobservable and significant to the fair value measurement.

The following is a description of the valuation methodologies used for assets measured at fair value. There have been no changes in the methodologies used at September 30, 2025 and 2024.

Money Market Funds: Valued at cost which approximates fair value

Certificates of Deposit: Valued based on investment managers use of pricing services using market data. These are classified as Level 2.

The methods described above may produce a fair value calculation that may not be indicative of net realizable value or reflective of future fair values. Furthermore, while the Alliance believes its valuation methods are appropriate and consistent, the use of different methodologies and assumptions to determine the fair value of certain financial instruments could result in a different fair value measurement at the reporting date.

Accounts Receivable

Accounts receivable represent unsecured noninterest bearing obligations and are carried at original invoice amounts less an estimate made for credit losses based on a review of all outstanding amounts on a monthly basis. Management determines the allowance for credit losses by identifying troubled accounts and performing a historical and future looking analysis. Receivables are written off when deemed uncollectible. Accounts receivable totaled \$85,079 and \$32,047 as of October 1, 2024 and 2023, respectively. The Alliance has determined that no allowance for credit loss was necessary at September 30, 2025 and 2024.

Grants and Contributions Receivable

The Alliance records unconditional grants and contributions receivable that are expected to be collected within one year at net realizable value. Grants and contributions receivable with expected collection past one year are recorded at net present value using risk-free rates applicable to the years in which the promises are received. The Organization monitors the collectability of these receivables and an allowance for uncollectable promises to give is recorded based on historical experience, an assessment of economic conditions, and a review of subsequent collections. The Organization has determined that no allowance for uncollectible accounts was necessary at September 30, 2025 and 2024.

Investments and Investment Income

Investments in money market funds and debt and equity securities with readily determinable fair values are reported at fair value, as determined by quoted market prices, with gains and losses included in the statement of activities. Investment income is recorded as earned.

The Alliance invests in a professionally managed portfolio that contains various types of securities (see Note 3). Such investments are exposed to market, interest rate and credit risk. Due to the level of risk associated with such investments, and the level of uncertainty related to changes in the value of such investments, it is at least reasonably possible that changes in the near term would materially affect investment balances and the amounts reported in the financial statements.

Contributions of Non-Financial Assets

The Alliance recognizes donated services, if any, that create or enhance nonfinancial assets, or that require specialized skills, are provided by individuals possessing those skills, and would typically need to be purchased if not provided by donation. Individuals volunteer their time and perform a variety of tasks that assist the Alliance with specific programs. The value of these donated services is not reflected in the accompanying financial statements since the volunteers' time does not meet the criteria for recognition.

Grants and Contributions

Grants and contributions received are recorded as net assets without donor restrictions or with donor restrictions depending on the absence or existence and nature of any donor restrictions. Donor-restricted grants and contributions whose restrictions are satisfied in the same period are reported as net assets without donor restrictions.

Unconditional grants and contributions are recognized when the related promise to give is received. Conditional grants and contributions, that is, those with a measurable performance or other measurable barrier, and a right of return or release, are not recognized in revenue until the conditions on which they depend have been substantially met. Amounts received prior to the conditions being substantially met are reported as refundable advances in the statement of financial position, which amounted to \$3,931,828 and \$724,922 at September 30, 2025 and 2024, respectively. The Alliance has been awarded conditional grants of \$5,201,000 and \$9,326,000 that have not been recognized at September 30, 2025 and 2024, respectively because the conditions (qualifying expenditures) have not yet been satisfied.

Revenue From Contracts with Customers

The Alliance accounts for revenue from contracts with customers as exchange transactions in the statement of activities as revenue without donor restrictions.

In determining the appropriate amount of revenue to be recognized as it fulfills its obligations under its agreements, the Alliance performs the following steps in accordance with Topic 606: (i) identification of the promised goods or services in the contract; (ii) determination of whether the promised goods or services are performance obligations including whether they are distinct in the context of the contract; (iii) measurement of the transaction price, including the constraint on variable consideration; (iv) allocation of the transaction price to the performance obligations based on estimated selling prices; and (v) recognition of revenue when (or as) the Alliance satisfies each performance obligation.

Contract services is based on contracted rates for services and collected either in advance of the service resulting in a deferred revenue balance or at the time the service is provided and immediately recognized as revenue. Contract services revenue is recognized over time as the services are provided.

Annual conference income is based on published fixed rates and collected either at the time of registration, in advance of the conference resulting in a deferred revenue balance or at the time the conference takes place and immediately recognized as revenue. Annual conference revenues are recognized at the point in time when the conference is conducted.

The Alliance had no contract liabilities as of October 1, 2023 and October 1, 2024.

Functional Allocation of Expenses

The costs of providing various programs and other activities have been presented on a functional basis in the statement of activities and detailed within the statement of functional expenses. Expenses directly attributable to a specific functional area are reported as expenses of that functional area. Expenses not directly attributable to a specific functional area are allocated. Significant expenses that are allocated included certain salaries, employee benefits and payroll taxes which were allocated based on estimates of time and effort.

Income Tax Status

The Alliance is exempt from federal income tax under Section 501(c)(3) of the Internal Revenue Code. However, income from certain activities not directly related to the Alliances' tax-exempt purpose is subject to taxation as unrelated business income. In addition, the Alliance qualifies for the charitable contribution deduction under Section 170(b)(1)(A) and has been classified as an organization other than a private foundation under Section 509(a)(1).

GAAP requires entities to evaluate, measure, recognize and disclose any uncertain income tax positions. GAAP prescribes a minimum recognition threshold that a tax position is required to meet in order to be recognized in the financial statements. The Alliance believes that it had no uncertain tax positions as defined in the standard.

Leases

Operating leases are recorded as right-of-use assets and lease liabilities in the statements of financial position in accordance with of ASU 2016-02, *Leases* (Topic 842). The Alliance categorizes leases with contractual terms longer than twelve months as either operating or finance. Finance leases are generally those leases that allow the Alliance to substantially utilize or pay for the entire asset over its estimated life. All other leases are categorized as operating leases. Leases with a term of twelve months or less are not included on the statement of financial position and are accounted for as an expense in the statement of activities as rental payments are incurred. The Alliance had no finance leases during the fiscal years ended December 31, 2025 and 2024.

Operating lease assets represent the Alliance's right to use an underlying asset for the lease term and lease liabilities represent its obligation to make lease payments arising from the lease. Operating lease assets and liabilities are recognized at commencement date based on the present value of lease payments over the lease term. The Alliance uses the implicit rate when readily determinable. When the lease does not provide an implicit rate, the Alliance uses a secured borrowing rate based on the information available at commencement date in determining the present value of lease payments.

Options to extend lease terms, terminate leases before the contractual expiration date, or purchase the leased assets, are evaluated for their likelihood of exercise. If it is reasonably certain that the option will be exercised, the option is considered in determining the classification and measurement of the lease.

Summarized Prior-Year Information

The financial statements include certain prior-year summarized comparative information in total for comparative purposes. Such information does not include sufficient detail to constitute a presentation in conformity with GAAP. Accordingly, such information should be read in conjunction with the Alliance's financial statements for the year ended September 30, 2024, from which the summarized information was derived.

Concentration of Credit Risk

The Alliance has significant cash balances at financial institutions which throughout the year regularly exceed the amounts insured by either the Federal Deposit Insurance Corporation with a limit of \$250,000 or the Securities Investor Protection Corporation. Any loss incurred or lack of access to such funds could have a significant adverse impact on the Alliance's financial condition, change in net assets, and cash flows.

Concentration of Revenue and Contributions Receivable

The Alliance received 77% from one funding source of its total revenue and support for the year ended September 30, 2025. One donor consists of 89% of grants and contributions receivable at September 30, 2025. Any significant reduction in the level of support from these funding sources could have an effect on the Alliance's programs.

5. LOAN PAYABLE – ECONOMIC INJURY DISASTER LOAN

In June 2020, the Alliance received a loan secured by all tangible and intangible property of the Alliance in the amount of \$100,000 from the Small Business Administration under the economic injury loan program. Pursuant to the terms of the agreement, monthly payments of principal and interest in the amount of \$428 began on June 18, 2021 and are payable each month through May 2050. The loan bears interest at a rate of 2.75% per annum. The Alliance has and intends to make monthly payments of principal and interest of \$2,000 until the loan is paid off.

7. OPERATING LEASE

In 2017, the Alliance entered into a lease for its administrative office under a non-cancelable operating lease which expired in April 2024. In December 2020, the Alliance amended this lease with the landlord. The amended lease reduced the Alliance's office space from 3,603 rentable square feet to 1,538 rentable square feet commencing on February 1, 2021. The amendment called for a relocation payment of \$175,000. A portion of the relocation payment was applied to the monthly rent through October 31, 2021. The amended lease was scheduled to expire in October 2026. In April 2023, the Alliance entered into an early termination agreement to terminate the lease in October 2023. Rent expense for its administrative office was \$0 and \$8,759 for 2025 and 2024, respectively.

8. RETIREMENT PLAN

The Alliance has a 401(k) tax deferred annuity plan covering all eligible employees. The plan allows eligible employees to defer a portion of their compensation, subject to the limitations in the Internal Revenue Code. The Alliance makes a 3% contribution on behalf of all eligible employees and a matching contribution to the plan up to 5% of the eligible employees' elective deferrals. The Alliance's contributions to the plan were \$211,289 and \$213,237 for 2025 and 2024, respectively.

9. DEFERRED COMPENSATION

Effective October 1, 2024, the Alliance established an IRC Section 457(b) plan, wherein the Alliance contributes annually on behalf of certain employees for their years of service with the Alliance. The deferred compensation is not available to them until their time of separation from the Alliance. Total fair value of the assets in the plan was \$92,000 and \$0 at September 30, 2025 and 2024, respectively.

10. LIQUIDITY AND AVAILABILITY OF RESOURCES

1. GENERAL INFORMATION

The accompanying schedule of expenditures of federal awards (the "Schedule") presents the activities in all the federal award programs of School-Based Health Alliance (the "Alliance") for the year ended September 30, 2025. All financial assistance received directly from federal agencies, as well as financial awards passed through other governmental and nonprofit agencies, are presented on the Schedule. The information in this schedule is presented in accordance with the requirements of the Title 2 U.S. Code of Federal Regulations Part 200, *Uniform Administrative Requirements, Cost Principles, and Audit Requirements for Federal Awards* ("Uniform Guidance").

2. BASIS OF ACCOUNTING

Expenditures reported on the Schedule are reported on the accrual basis of accounting. Such expenditures are recognized following the cost principles contained in the Uniform Guidance, wherein certain types of expenditures are not allowable or are limited to reimbursement. Therefore, some amounts presented in this schedule may differ from amounts presented in, or used in the preparation of, the basic financial statements.

3. INDIRECT COSTS

The Alliance has elected not to use the 15 percent de minimus indirect cost rate allowed under the Uniform Guidance. Indirect costs included in the Schedule are charged to the federal government based on an approved indirect cost rate agreement (23% for 2025). This agreement allows the Alliance to charge indirect costs based on the amount of direct charges incurred for the award, less any participant support costs, capital expenditures and the amount of subawards in excess of \$25,000. The amount charged on federal awards for indirect costs may differ from amounts allocated between program services and supporting services on the statements of activities and statements of functional expenses.

4. RELATIONSHIP TO BASIC FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

Federal awards expenditures are reported on the statements of activities and functional expenses. In certain programs, the expenditures reported in the basic financial statements may differ from the expenditures reported in the schedule of expenditures of federal awards due to program expenditures exceeding grant or contract budget limitations which are not included as federal awards.

A *significant deficiency* is a deficiency, or a combination of deficiencies, in internal control that is less severe than a material weakness, yet important enough to merit attention by those charged with governance.
